Two Events Honoring Lary Swoboda

Mark your calendars for September 29th and October 24th for two events to celebrate the life and remarkable career of service of Lary Swoboda.

Lary was a lifelong resident of Luxemburg, and was a teacher in the Southern Door school system.

He was elected to the Assembly District 1 (AD1) seat, representing Door and Kewaunee Counties, and served as a Democratic legislator from 1971 to 1994. He was renowned for always having time to listen to his constituents, and for his ability to work across the aisle.

After leaving the legislature, he served as state director of Americorps. He subsequently earned a Ph.D., and became a school administrator.

Lary was Chair of the Kewaunee County Democratic Party for many years, and was truly the "Grand Old Man" of AD1 Democratic politics.

He died unexpectedly November 25, 2012, leaving his wife of 44 years, Jan (Hendricks).

results of closing the federal Government down. "We speak for the American People...it is time for the Senate to listen to us", Speaker Boehner is quoted as saying Friday morning.

The facts are far different. Republicans coming off an election in which they failed to retake the Presidency despite high unemployment and a weak economy, and failed to retake the Senate even though far more Democratic seats than the opposition were at risk.

For the G.O.P. leadership to claims to speak for the voters even though they held the House only through a the combination of gerrymandering and the vagaries of redistricting is in fact a lie. Factually, the Democrats won the popular ballot by 1.4 million votes.

My take on it, by Estella Lauter:

Back to the Basics 2: Immigration

While our socalled representatives in Congress are trying to bring down the government without being blamed for doing so, still another major issue of our era remains in limbo.

Last June, I heard an excellent talk by Jose Luis Romero

Hicks, a Mexican lawyer with a strong record in public service and private practice who received a Distinguished Alumni Award from Lawrence University. His presentation clarified many issues for me, among them some very good reasons for the U.S. to reform our immigration policy *now*.

Sr. Romero Hicks began by saying that we have an opportunity to forge a new policy that only comes every 12 years when the Presidents of our two countries assume office within months of each other and set their agendas for the next four (or in Mexico six) years. The new Mexican President, Enrique Pena Nieto, has already secured promising agreements with his government about the directions Mexico will take in the next six years, and he has begun a series of meetings with President Obama that Romero Hicks hopes will lead to a new consciousness of shared North American interests in the world at large.


The reasons Romero Hicks gave for reframing U.S. immigration policies, however, were economic (in marked contrast to the "moral" arguments we often hear in the U.S.), and they were surprisingly beneficial to the U.S. Here are some of the statistics from the talk:

- U.S. –Mexican border municipalities and counties have a population of 13 million people; the ten border states would constitute the world's 4th largest economy.
- Mexican immigrants (who comprise 30% of all U.S. immigrants)in the last 10 years contributed 4 points of GDP in the U.S. economy.
- 570,000 businesses in the US are owned by a Mexican immigrant, generating over 17 billion dollars in revenue per year.
- In 2012, Mexico-US total trade reached USD \$494 billion; that's more than USD \$1.3 billion per day. Trade with Mexico is not only bigger than the GDP of Belgium, Poland or Taiwan, but is also highly integrated along a complex and dynamic supply chain. The Mexico-US border has 56 ports of entry. 300,000 vehicle crossings take place every day (including 70,000 trailers).

- Soon, the first new railway crossing in over 100 years will start operations.
- Over the 19 years of NAFTA, trade between Mexico and the U.S. has grown six-fold (10% annually, a rate that exceeds that of the U.S. trade with the rest of the world (7%). Mexican exports to the U.S. have grown seven-fold, surpassing \$277 billion in 2012, which maintained Mexico's position as the U.S.'s third largest supplier. U.S. sales to Mexico increased by 420%; in 2012 they surpassed \$216 billion, making Mexico the second largest market for U.S. products. The US content of Mexican exports to the US is estimated at around 40%.

Given these facts, it is surprising—perhaps even shocking—that the American public discussion of relationships with Mexico is focused so exclusively on border crossings, fences, illegal employment practices, and citizenship for children of immigrants who were born here (not to mention guns and drugs, as if we had no responsibility for those). Why are U.S. Representatives not thinking more creatively about the economic well-being of both nations?

In discussion after his presentation, Sr. Romero Hicks made a final point that I think should be crucial in our public discussion of immigration: at present, our fierce border patrol actually forces Mexican workers to stay in the U.S. as either legal or illegal immigrants instead of returning home when a job is done. We have created a system of "forced immigration" (with built-in problems of illegal crossings and employment, separated families, disputed citizenship and benefits) instead of a fluid system based on economic realities.

Wisconsin's School Funding Cuts Among the Nation's Deepest

"Wisconsin's cuts to education are the 7th largest in the country ... These cuts deepened the recession, slowed the recovery, and have the potential to make Wisconsin less prosperous in the future...

"Wisconsin has cut state investment in K-12 schools by 15.3% since 2008, a deeper cut than 43 other states, according to a report released by the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities, a non-partisan policy research organization...

"When cuts in state aid for education are measured in dollar amounts rather than percentage terms, Wisconsin's cuts to education since the recession rank second in the nation, trailing only Alabama's cuts. In 2014, Wisconsin will spend \$1,038 less per student in state aid for K-12 education than it did in 2008, after adjusting for inflation.

"Most states are spending less on education than they did at the time of the recession, but there are some notable exceptions. Two states that border Wisconsin maintained or increased investment in K-12 education between 2008 and 2014: Minnesota, which held state spending on

education constant over this period, and lowa, which invests \$550 more per student in state aid for education now than it did in 2008.

"Cuts to education have consequences for students and classrooms. One effect of shrinking resources is a slow decline in the number of teachers who are educating Wisconsin's future workforce. Between 2008 and 2013, the number of teachers in Wisconsin public schools fell by nearly 2,100 a reduction of 3.5% in the teacher workforce, according to the state Department of Public Instruction. The result: crowded classrooms and sub-optimal learning conditions for students.

"State revenues have begun to recover from the beating they took during the recession, but Wisconsin has only reinvested a small fraction of the education funding that was cut during the downturn. Instead, policymakers have diverted revenues that could have been invested in education to implement an income tax cut that mainly benefits the highest earners.

"At a time when the nation is trying to produce workers with the skills to master new technologies and adapt to the complexities of a global economy, Wisconsin should be investing more — not less — to ensure our kids get a strong education. These deep cuts to education have undermined our ability to educate Wisconsin's children and there could be consequences for Wisconsin's economy down the road."
